Can my child come to school?

Schools have been re-opened by the Government because it has been assessed that the benefits of direct face to face teaching, physical education, emotional and social benefits of attending school outweigh the small risk of childhood illness through contracting Covid-19. This is further supported by the school's internal measures to manage hygiene and social distancing as part of our own risk assessment and control. We understand that you as families want to support the safety of not only your own children, but of our whole school community. As we enter the coughs and colds season, the following chart may helpful for you in assessing whether your child is able to attend school, and to also provide clarification about when work should be completed at home. We are fully aware that a wide variety of childhood ailments still exist, and wish to emphasise that no child will be expected to complete work whilst they are ill. However, under current guidance there may be circumstances where your child needs to stay at home even if they are not physically unwell themselves. Working at home is designed for these circumstances only.
